**FRY FOODS 2023 INDUSTRIAL DISCHARGE PERMIT – Action Item. [7:12:36 PM](#)**

Lonnie Chambers, Wastewater Department Supervisor, the permit this year went great, Fry Foods was happy with everything so it is now ready for the Mayor to sign if the Council so wishes. Mayor Hibberd, were there any significant changes? Lonnie, there was one small change in the verbiage on Fats, Oils and Grease. Currently in the old permit it just said we do four random tests per month, the verbiage was changed so that if the City believes the sample is over the 100 max that we can test that at any given time. We will still do the random once per week test on the Fat Oils and Grease, anything over 100 what we found at the Wastewater Plant is that it does cause an issue with foaming, it coats things so that is why there is a limit on the permit.

Lonnie Chambers, it's not part of the permit but what Mr Hopkins is talking about is that Fry Foods wanted to

be able to put their probe in the City's Sample Station so they could get the reading right away. We do bill on pH if they're under a certain amount or over. The City wants to keep everything separate so we are not going to be putting a Fry Foods pH probe in the City property.

**DAVID J. TOUSSAINT REQUESTING ANNEXATION AND A C-3 COMMERCIAL ZONING DESIGNATIONG – Action Item. [7:15:31 PM](#)**

Larry Hogg, P&Z Commission Council Representative. You received in your packets both the Staff Report and the Findings of Facts from the members of the P & Z Commission. I will say the applicant for annexation was very upfront with their intention for the property and some of the comments and concerns are more related to the use of the property than the actual annexation. I would remind everyone that annexation is what we are dealing with so I ask you to keep that in mind because the use of the property for what we are deciding tonight is just what we allow in a C-3 Zone. So the question is shall we annex the property and shall we designate it as C-3 Commercial. If we approve it, they would be able to do anything that is allowed in a C-3 Commercial Zone. Just in my opinion the Commission did vote four to one to support approval of the annexation. There were concerns related to a specific use that is allowed in C-3 and I know you have had a chance to look at those. My two cents worth here is that, Filling Stations or Service Stations are allowed in C-3, to me we already have similar businesses within a rocks throw of this property. The difference being, if that is the ultimate use the property will be subject to standards and rules and regulations far greater in my opinion than any of the other like businesses that are close to the property. To me this is an improvement to the entrance to our City...

**AUTHORIZE POLICE TO PURCHASE 14 HANDHELD RADIOS & ACCESSORIES USING ARPA FUNDS \$49,046.44 – Action Item. **7:32:18 PM****

Police Chief Carl Smith, it came to light that there was ARPA money and that communications qualified to be able to use ARPA money. I met with David and put together a quote to replace our aging portable radios. I'm asking to purchase fourteen portable radios and the accessories that go with them. Currently we have two sets of portable radios that are ten to fifteen years old. This one radio would replace two radios. This would be a great opportunity to replace that aging fleet of radios which I was going to have to start doing one to two radios at a time, but this affords us to be able to do it all in one fell swoop. Also, the County is going to the same radios and the Fire Department is going to the

same radios so we would all have the same communications. I am asking the City Council to approve the amount of \$49,046.44 to purchase these fourteen radios.

This will design both first and second phase to get the power to and also through out the subdivision. It definitely has to be engineered to make sure we get the right amount of transformers per house and uses and stuff. **REQUEST AUTHORIZATION TO PURCHASE A NEW BUCKET TRUCK FOR THE ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT \$249,805.00.00 – Action Item. 7:38:34 PM**

Wayne Wallace, Electric Department Supervisor. I am here tonight to request the spending authority to replace a 1999 Aerial Bucket Truck with a 2022 Aerial Bucket Truck for the sum of \$249,805.00. They have let us know that that price could change by the time we take delivery. Even if we add it to the cart tomorrow, it may not be the exact same price at delivery time, we're probably looking at eight months out to receive this truck. I did budget for this \$275,000.00 to purchase this truck which I'm sure is going to be plenty to do, but I do want to get it out there that this price could change by the time this truck arrives.

**7:39:52 PM** – Mayor Hibberd, from what I understand, if later on it goes up more than what the Council is willing to spend, we can back out on it. Wayne Wallace, that is my understanding as well,

I'm surely hoping that is not the case.

**7:40:08 PM** – Wayne Wallace, Versa Lift and Terex were three to four years out on any truck. Altec, by going with a very standard, no options whatsoever, but going through the specs on it it's going to work just fine for our application here. The aerial reach is five feet taller than the truck we have now.

**7:40:53 PM** – Cliff Barberis, so if we sign a contract that we want this thing, that doesn't mean squat does it? They can raise the price whatever they want, right? Mike Campbell, not necessarily, they will do their best to keep it this price but with the way prices are changing no vehicle manufacturers right now will guarantee a price that far out. They just want us to beware if the price comes in higher we do have the option to come back to Council to discuss it before we purchase it, they're not going to hold us to it but he is pretty sure it's going to stay the same price he just didn't want to promise that due to shipping changes and cost of goods that have changed so much, and where this is eight months out he just wanted us to be very well aware that this quote could change in the next eight to ten months before we see this truck. Just fore warned that it's a possibility. Sterling Blackwell, if it can go up it can go down, right? Mike, it very well could. I did ask him that same question and he did say that's not impossible depending on cost of goods, importing of goods and timing. The problem is these goods are not available to put this truck away until they're ordered and when they're received even they're paying different prices for them than their standard bid quotes. I think we are seeing that across the board in almost all purchasing at this time.

**7:42:11 PM** – Mike Campbell, our truck if you'll remember for the Water Department, we got it in within a couple of months after we ordered it in January Ford went to the same thing, they wouldn't hold the price for us after I believe January 15<sup>th</sup> or something to that nature. So we got in on it and they held the price but after that they went up. As a matter of fact they won't even quote price right now on some of these trucks.
